

Most people associate Wyatt Earp and Josephine Marcus Earp with the town of Tombstone, Arizona and the famous and controversial shootout. But this adventurous pair lived in many other places. Josephine moved to San Francisco from New York as a child. Wyatt lived here with his brothers, and then later with Josie. There are many stories associated with both of them, and their connection to friends and family in the Bay Area. Join San Francisco History Association board member Judi Leff as she takes us on a tour of these places and stories right here in our own backyard. Judi Leff, who is a teacher for older adults, is the historian for the Colma Jewish cemeteries, which, it may surprise you to learn, contain the final resting place for both Wyatt and Josephine Earp. Theirs is the most visited grave in Colma.

The San Francisco Corral of Westerners International was honored to have Sheriff Paul Miyamoto speak to us at our February Meeting. Sheriff Miyamoto is the first Asian-American sheriff elected in San Francisco's 175-year history. He assumed office on January 8, 2020.


Sheriff Miyamoto joined the Sheriff's Office in 1996 and rose through the ranks. He also commanded the two largest Sheriff's Office divisions, Custody and Field Operations, and is a member of the Sheriff's Special Response Team. Sheriff Miyamoto serves on the boards of the National Association of Asian American Professionals in San Francisco and the Guardians of the City, which preserves and promotes the history of San Francisco public safety.

Sheriff Miyamoto is a fourth-generation native San Franciscan, and a graduate of Lowell High School and the University of California, Davis. He carries a family legacy of resilience. His late father, Philip Miyamoto, was the subject of a February 2022 article in the *San Francisco Chronicle* about his family's triumph over adversity during the Japanese internment during World War II.

The Sheriff is equally proud of his Chinese roots, inherited from his mother, and is a dedicated member of the San Francisco Police Department's Lion Dance team for the Chinese New Year Parade. He participates in San Francisco's annual Pistahan Parade every year, honoring his wife LeeAnn and their children's Filipino heritage. He and LeeAnn, a former San Francisco Deputy Sheriff and San Francisco Police Officer, have five children that include a set of triplets.

Sheriff Miyamoto told us that he has worked with the City's justice partners to safely lower the jail count and reduce the risk of COVID among the most medically vulnerable persons in custody. To date, there have been no significant COVID outbreaks, hospitalizations, or deaths in San Francisco County jails. He's also provided free phone calls for inmates, the first county in the nation to do so. Sheriff Miyamoto gave an impressive presentation that enlightened us to the challenges faced by law enforcement on a daily basis.
